## From The Trustees -

Here's what's happening at South Afton Commerce Park, a 242 acre business park being built at SR 32 and Half Acre Road in Williamsburg Township! The first phase of infrastructure is nearing completion. This includes nearly 2,000 linear feet of roadway, 5,800 linear feet of sanitary force main, and 1,700 linear feet of gravity sewer.

The county is making progress on on extending rail into the site, and they are working on a preferred alignment with Norfolk Southern. A wetlands study has been completed. There will soon be a second "for sale" sign on the site; the first one had led to several inquiries. Interested in finding out more about Clermont's largest industrial park? #### WHY "SOUTH AFTON"?

This site is very close to the historical unincorporated area of Afton, which was centered at the intersection of Half Acre Road and Old SR 32. The CIC Board of Trustees considered a variety of names for this business park, and South Afton Commerce Park (SACP) was the ultimate choice for several reasons: First, it is easy to say and the advanced manufacturing industries that exist today, as opposed to something like "Clermont County SR 32 Industrial Park." Also, it honors a historic place in the community which the CIC felt was important to do, and provides an instant geographic reference for people in the community.

The CIC understands that the historical center of "Afton" is actually south of the site. there could never be geographically accurate industrial park called "South Afton," because East Fork State Park lies directly south of that intersection. The CIC took the liberty of moving the north/south divide of "Afton" to SR 32, because they hope someday there will be a "North Afton Commerce Park" developed nearby when SACP is built out! This part of Clermont County holds the future for large-scale industrial growth, and Clermont County is working every day to improve the SR 32 corridor to ensure businesses can locate and thrive in this area. The CIC hopes local historians will oblige its movement of Afton and will appreciate knowing the name will live on for decades to come!

The project, guided by the Clermont County Commissioner and the Clermont County Economic Development Department, is progressing at a steady pace as a business ready site for manufacturers. The property was purchased on February 1, 2016 and will lead to good paying jobs, new property tax revenue to support our local school district, township services, and countywide services. In April 2017, Williamsburg Township Trustee, Gary Jordan, was extended and accepted an opportunity to sit on the CIC, Inc. Board with the Clermont County Commissioners and Clermont County Economic Development team.

Recently, the Clermont County Trustees Association met at the Clermont County Public Health Department. After our regular order of business, the Clermont County Trustees adjourn, and a Clermont County District Advisory Council Meeting was held. This meeting is always an eye opener on the added value this department gives to our communities. You can access their site through clermonthealthdistrict.org. significant group has a lot to offer, such as, immunizations for international travel, women infants and children (WIC), tobacco cessation counseling, birth and death certificates, to name a few services. They also provide support and direction concerning the heroin and drug epidemic, which our country is facing. More can be found on their website. Take the time to review their site to become familiar to the wide variety of services they provide. Larry Cadwallader, Williamsburg Township resident, is an active board member of this group.

The 2016 winter was very light which lessened the damage to our roads and the amount of salt to put down for safety. ### Williamsburg Township Road and Cemetery

Spring time is here, I want to remind everyone that any flowers or decorations left in the grass at the cemetery will be removed for mowing and trimming. If you need to purchase graves please call the office at 513-724-1110 to make an appointment. Junk Days is Thursday June 8, Friday June 9 from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. and Saturday June 10 from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Items we do not accept are tires, batteries, anything in liquid form and household trash. If you have large items that you need assistance unloading please stop and ask one of the maintenance guys to help unload your items.

The Township recently purchased a used A Boom mower and tractor for mowing and cutting brush back along the roadways. The Township saved approximately \$50000 buying a good used mower and tractor. The maintenance crew will be out this summer and thru the winter cutting the brush back along all roadways. Be cautious when approaching any equipment working in the roadways.

In early March and early April, we had some bad storms move thru the area. There were trees down and power lines down. Houses that received damage as well. Williamsburg Township Emergency Services and Williamsburg Township Maintenance Department worked quickly together cleaning up and removing the debris from roadways and helping residents any way they could. Both Township departments work very well together.


This past winter was very mild, the township maintenance crew only used about 25 tons of salt. In past years, normal average usage is around 100 tons of salt used.

## · Williamsburg Township Zoning Office ·

If a property owner wants to know the zoning district where their property is located, there is a zoning map at the zoning office. Anyone may see the map to get information. On the Real Estate taxes from Clermont County Auditor there is a district designated. That district is how they figure the taxes and not necessarily the zoning district for the property in Williamsburg Township. For instance, the County Auditor may have the property designated residential and in the Township it is zoned Agricultural, Business, or even Industrial.

Harmony Hill Highland Hall. located at 192 South Third Street in Williamsburg. Ohio, was built in 1846 by T.E.Sinks as a wedding present to his daughter and son-in-law. Questions remain as to when the construction began and when the project was finished. The original bricks were made on site by the workers at the brick factory in Williamsburg. The original site was a farm which included a big barn and outbuildings. The foundation of the barn is still in place. The home has eight rooms two bathrooms, and long hallways, both upstairs and down. There have been several families who have lived in the residence. In 1918, the property was purchased by Francis Washington Walker and his wife. Annabelle Reed Walker, and it remains in that family today. The Acanthus Group (a Cincinnati restoration company founded by Mark Hornbaker) began restoring the home in 2001. This labor of love was completed in 2016. All the floors are original (white oak, poplar, pine), most of the ceiling electric lights date from 1923, and much of the furniture has been there almost 100 years. Although the kitchen has been updated and a bathroomadded downstairs, the driving force and the main goal of the home owners and the restoration company was to keep the integrity of the home. Only historic paint colors (Benjamin Moore) were used on the walls, the floors were refinished by hand, and research was done on every aspect of what was needed to keep the home's integrity in tact. In 1932, the home was passed down to F.W. and Annabelle Reed Walker's children including Pauline Walker Stockton, wife of Edgar Stockton, who, inturn passed it to their descendants, including Karen Stockton Cavicchia. Dr. Thomas H. and Karen Stockton Cavicchia are the current homeowners.
