Compatriot Col. Don McGraw led the heartwarming event, giving the history of the American Revolution and the part that individuals of our community played in it. Freedom is not free and these leaders played a significant role in the American revolution.

The memorial dedication commemorated eleven patriots buried in the Williamsburg Township Cemetery. The patriots are:

- Joseph Ball (1759-1864) Served as a soldier in the Revolutionary War.
- Adam Bricker (1762-1843) Enlisted at 14 in 1776, Marietta & Ft. Washington. Served as a private. Reenlisted under General St. Clair, in Battle of Fallen Timbers.
- Ramoth Bunton (1763-1831) Served as a Private in Virginia.
- Samual Burnet (1763-1862) a New Jersey soldier in the Revolutionary War.
- Thomas Foster (1746-1804) a soldier in the Revolutionary War.
- Jacob Fry (1765-1839) was a Private in the Revolutionary War.
- John Huber (1818) Served as a Colonel in the 9th Battalion, Pennsylvania Militia.
- James Kain, Jr. (1749-1815) was a guard for the Continental Congress-Corporal and Sergeant. He was also a Private in the 5th Company, 8th Battalion under Captain Samuel Boyd of the Lancaster County Militia.
- Moses Leonard (1759-1844) Wagoneer in the Revolution in Massachusetts.
- John Lytle (1767-1843) a soldier in the Revolutionary War.
- Absolom Smith (1756-1843) Served in the New Jersey Militia.

The ceremony was to acknowledge the grave marking for Patriot James Kain, Jr. on the 200th Anniversary of his death April 10, 1815. James Kain was the head of the first family to settle in Williamsburg Township, Ohio in 1796.

Williamsburg Harmony Hill Association served an important role in this ceremony. We acknowledge and appreciate all the hard work that Izella Cadwallader, James Lefferson, Lutrecia Snell, and the staff do, to preserve the history of Williamsburg Township through Williamsburg Harmony Hill.

The Williamsburg American Legion will again host a Memorial Day Parade on Monday May 25, 2015. The parade will start at 11:00 am from the American Legion, with a memorial at the Williamsburg Township Cemetery immediately following. This is a great opportunity, as a community, to recognize those who fought for our freedom, hope to see you there.

### Williamsburg Township Road and Cemetery

Recently the Cincinnati Chapter Sons of the Revolutionary War had a marker made for 11 Revolutionary War Veterans that are interned in Williamsburg Cemetery. On April 19, 2015 the marker was dedicated and unveiled. The marker is located in the oldest part of the cemetery below the red brick building.

The Township Maintenance Department took delivery of a 2015 International 7400 salt/dump truck in February. It replaced a 2000 International 4900 dump truck. During the winter 2014-2015 the township used approximately 130 tons of salt. This year the Township went with the county and several other Townships and Villages on paving projects. This year Cobb Road will be paved. When the Township joins the County and other Municipalities it saves everyone money. The Township also does this when they buy salt.

Article 2 General Provisions Section 210 Nuisance Prohibited

No abandoned, discarded, inoperable, wrecked unlicensed, unsafe, disabled, dismantled vehicles, motor vehicles or abandoned, discarded, unsafe manufactured homes or inoperable machinery, equipment, machine parts or abandoned, inoperable agriculture equipment or discarded furniture, appliances, junk or other miscellaneous materials shall be permitted to remain in any district for a period not to exceed thirty (30) days, other than if within a totally enclosed structure on the premises, with the exception of farm implements currently being used in agriculture.

Parking or storing of single wide or double wide mobile homes shall be prohibited, except on a sales lot properly zoned for the conduct of a business.

#### PATRIOT'S DAY CEREMONY

On Sunday, April 19th the Cincinnati Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution held a grave marking ceremony for Pioneer James Kain Jr. and a memorial dedication for eleven Revolutionary War Soldiers buried in Williamsburg Township Cemetery whom have never before been recognized for the service they provided, nor their sacrifices to give us the freedom we have come to enjoy in the United States of America.


The strong relationship of these men speaks to the solid patriotic roots on which the town of Williamsburg was established. Williamsburg is most definitely a community built on the principles of liberty that were established by our Constitution and the men who fought for its principles.

Following the ceremony at the cemetery, a program was held at the Williamsburg First Presbyterian Church, followed by a reception at the Valley View Tavern. The Tavern is located at the corner of Front and Main Streets and is adjacent to the lot where Kain built the first log cabin in the town in 1796 and established a tavern there.
